
SKININ THE GAME CIRCUMCISION CUTS THROUGH US ALL



OUR STORIES CONNECT US.

When Intact America (IA) launched our Voices series in 2017, we had trouble finding even one person willing to reveal their name and send a photo to publish with the story of the damage they had suffered from having their genitals cut as helpless babies or children. Now more and more people have found the price of secrecy and self-repression too great to endure. This groundswell of people aching to tell their truths paved the way for Intact America's story-telling photo campaign, called "SKIN **IN THE GAME: Circumcision** Cuts Through Us All," photographed by Kevin Garrett and designed by Hector Sanchez.

THE POWER OF LISTENING FROM THE HEART. THE MAGIC OF BEING HEARD.

The campaign photographs were taken in a series of three photo shoots, two in Atlanta and one in Dallas in 2023. Most participants were unknown to IA before they responded to online ads inviting interested people of any race, ethnicity, sex, and body type to have their pictures taken and share their circumcision story. Some said they'd been thinking about the harms of circumcision for years; others said they had never consciously considered the harm until they saw the ad. We met people of all ages, of every sexual orientation. The atmosphere was magical. As

the hours and days progressed, we realized that virtually everyone in our country has a circumcision story to share whether they know it or not. The resulting photos and quotes of participants are intensely emotional. They affirm the vital ongoing work of Intact America and illustrate the important messages of the two memoirs by leaders in the intactivist movement, This Penis Business by Georganne **Chapin** with Echo Montgomery Garrett and Please Don't Cut the Babu! by Marilyn Fayre Milos with Judy Kirkwood [2024, Lucid House Publishing].











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CHANGE IS COMING.





"I wrote the book to answer a question my friend Lucie Saunders asked me nearly two decades ago, as I was becoming active in the movement opposing routine medical circumcision of baby boys. Lucie was a neighbor and a retired anthropologist. We became friends and spent a great deal of time together talking about culture, customs, and people. One day not too long before her death in 2008, Lucie asked me, "How did you get into this... *this penis business*?"

"Since then, while leading Intact America, I thought a lot about Lucie's question. What seemed obvious to me—it makes no sense to routinely amputate a normal body part from a baby boy—didn't seem to occur to most other Americans I knew. Nor did most Americans know that the United States is the only country in the 'developed' world where doctors carry out this surgery routinely. And so, I felt compelled to explore the reasons I'd gotten into "this penis business."

When **Marilyn Fayre Milos**, then an obstetrical nursing student and mother of three circumcised sons, witnessed a circumcision in 1979 she was shocked.

"The doctor looked into my eyes and said, **'There is no medical reason for doing this**.'....Having been awakened to the unnecessary trauma of circumcision, would I simply be a witness to something I knew deep in my soul was a travesty and injustice to a tiny baby delivered into our care and protection? Pressure FROM CULTURE IS INTENSE.

When an expectant parent in the U.S. hears the words: **"You are having a boy,"** the solicitations from medical professionals to consent to circumcision, this "routine procedure" soon follow. An IA Qualtrics survey showed that a pregnant woman is solicited 8 times before her baby boy is born to agree to this irreversible surgery, which is classified as cosmetic and has no medical benefit.

For Black and Latina expectant mothers, the rate of solicitation is even higher.

Male genital cutting of infants and children under the age of consent is a violation of children's rights and perpetuated by the pursuit of profits.





Pressure Comes from Family Members.

Men want their sons to "look like" them. Because circumcision is so deeply embedded in our culture in the US, many people have never seen an intact penis with its foreskin, the natural protective covering for the glans. In fact, many medical books in the U.S. fail to show male genitalia with an intact foreskin.

Pressure Comes from peers AND SEXUAL PARTNERS.

Young men who are intact are often bullied for "looking different." We've heard a wide range of stories from the under-30 crowd on this topic.

Kishan Patel, a successful entrepreneur who immigrated from India at the age of three months, was seriously investigating circumcision when he met Kelly Floyd, who had become an intactivist at age 18 and is now IA's community programs manager. "If I had not met Kelly when I did, I probably would have done it, because I had gotten so much criticism."



"Let's respect babies' bodies from day one, and not when they finally have a voice, and can say, 'I don't like that.' By then, It's too late. You've already made a life-altering choice for an infant.

When we did our deep dive into circumcision, my husband said, 'I will never do that to my kids. I don't want to risk that.' He and I both feel sad for him as a baby, that it was done to him without his consent and choice. His mother apologized to him when we went down this path with our babies. She said, 'I was wrong, and I made a bad choice for you, and I'm sorry.' My three teenage sons are very vocal about being left whole and thank us for it."

WHY WOULD WE DO THAT?

In IA's 2020 survey of a national, random sample of 2,519 women, who'd given birth to boys between 2017 and 2020, **94 percent** reported that they were **asked**, **pressured**, **shamed**, **misled**, **or even coerced by doctors and nurses** in healthcare settings to "consent" to circumcision.


When their Ob/Gyn casually said, "If it's a boy, you're going to circumcise, right?" to Dean Pisani and his wife Jackie, a nurse at the time, the couple looked at each other puzzled. "Why would we do that?" asked Dean.

The doctor shrugged and said, "Everybody does it."

"That's not a good reason," said Dean. "The answer is no."

Dean found a calling. He frequently made donations to Marilyn Fayre Milos' National Organization of Circumcision Information Resource Centers (NOCIRC) and eventually spearheaded the talks that led to the formation of Intact America and became our foundational donor.

For Eduardo Cardoso, a U.S. Marine and actor, the bullying started in middle school where he was one of the only Latinos and was intact. "I was insecure and even thought about getting circumcised, but I had a close friend, whose mom was Mexican, too, and she talked to me about it. God made me this way and that's enough."

Board member Dan Bollinger calculated the cost of the circumcision, including doctors' fees, facility bills, and more, and then added: the cost of circumcision repairs (called "revisions by the industry); erectile dysfunction drugs (circumcised men are 4.5 times more likely to be diagnosed with erectile dysfunction; and personal lubricants (a circumcised penis is drier than in intact penis). **Considering that approximately 1.5 million baby boys' foreskins are amputated each year**, Bollinger estimated that total money spent in 2020 as a direct result of circumcision was

INJURIES CAUSED BY THOSE SWORN TO



What if those whose sons were injured or maimed for life or those who chose to keep their sons intact found their wishes ignored and their sons' foreskins forcibly retracted had a place to report medical professionals and facilities that were responsible? We are launching one of our most important undertakings yet: **DoNoHarm.Report**, a public-facing online portal will collect medical malpractice reports related to circumcision solicitation, circumcision injuries, and forcible foreskin retraction.

To plan for DoNoHarm's launch, we surveyed parents about how medical providers have treated their intact boys.

DoNoHarm will have the capacity to capture thousands — if not tens of thousands of these incidents. It will also track complaint responses and non-responses from hospitals, providers, and state regulatory agencies. Then, IA will bring this evidence of medical negligence and abuse to the public's attention — and tear down the American Circumcision Machine from within.





"The whole point of being happy is being happy with oneself and I didn't have the opportunity to be happy with myself because it was taken from me before I could even consent."

Intact America has begun to build a network of mental health professionals who can be a resource for our community.

Together, we can reach the tipping point where removing a boy's foreskin will no longer be the norm.



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
